

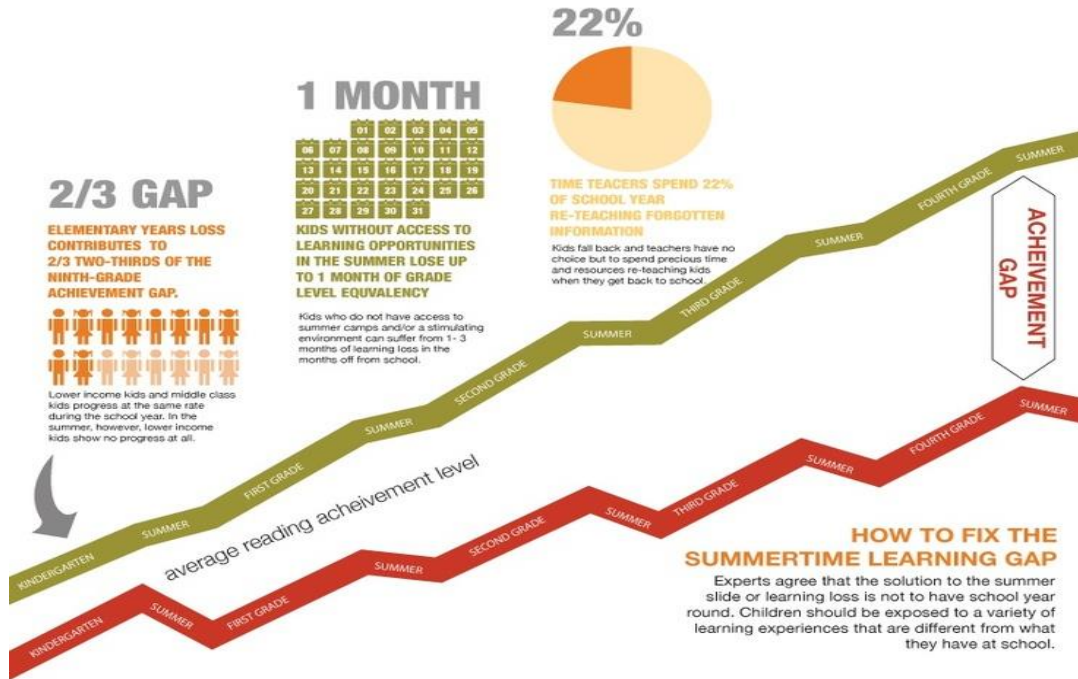


Reading List 2023-2024



PREVENT THE SUMMER SLIDE!

In elementary age kids, the summer months can undo months of learning from the school year. Paying attention to what our kids are doing when they are off school is important not only for their performance in the upcoming year, but also to help them do better as they set out for college years later.



- 1 SURROUND KIDS WITH A VARIETY OF BOOKS.**
Kids are more likely to read when they get to choose a book themselves. Give them access to a number of books at their reading level and have them choose.
- 2 READ WITH YOUR CHILD - AID WITH COMPREHENSION AND LEARNING**
Comprehension is key to becoming a good reader. Sit down with your child while he/she reads. Make it an experience you both share.
- 3 READ CONSISTENTLY - EVEN IF IT IS FOR JUST A FEW MINUTES EVERY DAY**
Regular reading is key in order to turn reading into a habit. No matter where you are - traveling, in an airplane or at grandmas - make sure to carve a few minutes for regular reading time. Before bedtime or first thing in the morning are the easiest to incorporate into your day.
- 4 TRACK YOUR CHILD'S READING, MOTIVATE YOUR CHILD**
Keeping a log, giving your child points, having them work towards a goal, are all great ways to motivate a child to read regularly.
- 5 FILL YOUR CHILD'S DAYS WITH ENRICHING ACTIVITIES RELATED TO THEIR READING.**
Extend reading with fun book related crafts and activities. They make reading more fun, drive learning and are great ways to engage a budding but reluctant reader.

Open up the world of books to the children in your life. Help them cultivate a life long love for reading. It is the best gift you can ever give them.

Students Entering First Grade **Suggested Summer Reading Strategies and Books**

Reading Strategies to Practice:

- Have a regular time and place to read each day.
- Find a good fit book using the “Five Finger” method. Five unknown words on a page is too difficult. One unknown word is too easy. Two or three words can challenge you but not frustrate you.
- Practice rereading favorite books to improve your fluency.
- Take a picture walk and get your mind ready to read.
- Retell the story to show your comprehension: Tell what happened first, next, then, and last.
- Don’t be afraid to pick a new book. If it is too challenging, read it with an adult and practice your oral comprehension.
- Apply as many strategies as you can to figure out unknown words.
- When you get to an unknown word: Break it up, don’t make it up!
- Practice your sight/high frequency words.
- Review your letters and sounds! Use them to build words you know.
- Find a chunk or part of a word that you know: -ing, -at, sh-, etc.
- Look closely at the pictures for clues to unknown words.
